An Interview with Janet Gieck

Tell us a bit about your background.

I grew up on a farm in Saskatchewan, into a family where music was celebrated. My mother was always singing and required all her children to sing with her at different events. We attended a small church where everyone sang in four-part harmony all the time, and I was encouraged from a very young age to sing in the choirs and to be involved in accompanying different groups on the piano. As I entered my teen years, I became interested in synthesizers as well as rock and jazz music. This was when I began experimenting with composition. I never took any formal composition lessons until college, but people seemed to like whatever I played for them, so I was encouraged and continued writing. I think

this is a great reminder to me of how much of a difference a word of encouragement to a young person can make!

What inspires your music writing?


I would say that I am inspired by my family and by Prairie culture and landscape. The space, the skies and the Northern forests are incredible! Also I find music and sound in and of themselves inspiring. Hearing a new scale or a new sound can lead to a new composition. The talents of the other Red Leaf composers are also very inspiring – they encourage me to do my best, both musically and professionally.



Three new books are available from Teresa Richert. Northern **Menagerie** is a collection of twelve solo piano pieces inspired by wild creatures of Canada. The pieces exhibit a variety of

styles and forms. Seasons is a collection of eight lyrical piano solos inspired by nature and outdoor activities associated with the four seasons. The pieces explore a wide range of moods and technical challenges.

What keeps you busy when you're not composing?

I have a studio of piano and theory students, (yes, I love theory!) and I am quite involved in my church. My husband is the pastor of music and arts there, so he is always giving me projects to compose and arrange. We have 3 children (ages 8, 6, and 4) so next year will hold new adventures for me, having all my kids in school!

Tell us a bit about your music.

Dances, Daydreams & Dinosaurs is my easiest book to date and has 17 imaginative pieces for the younger student. There is exposure to both traditional harmonies, and more contemporary kinds of writing. The complimentary piece, Outdoor Skating Rink, is from this collection. Sundae Soup (Vols. 1 & 2) contain a variety of styles and rhythms, from jazz idioms to more atonal sounds. Outside My Window (Vols. 1 & 2) are more advanced and hold my earliest compositions which lean toward a more impressionistic style. My duet collection, The Birthday of a King, is a recital favorite, with four intermediate level Christmas carols inside. The second complimentary piece, Frantic: Homework Deadline, is an exciting blast of sound, perfect for the energetic teenager at an early advanced level. It is one of my newer works and is based on the octatonic scale. •
